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## Calling All Agencies and Organizations

The Town of Youngtown is calling all non-profit and for profit agencies and organizations to apply for the Town of Youngtown's Outside Agency Appropriations Program. This application is available for all non-profit and for profit agencies and organizations that are providing essential services to the residents of Youngtown and may need a little extra assistance for implementing these services. **The deadline for submittal is Friday, October 14, 2016 no later than 4:00 p.m.**

The decision to fund all or part of a requested appropriation will be made by the Town Council, based on information provided in this application and other information deemed relevant by the Town Council.

Appropriation will only be considered for those agencies/organizations whose intended use of the funds can reasonably be expected to provide a benefit to the Town and value to the community sufficient to justify the expenditure.

Examples of criteria that may be considered by the Council in determining a project or an organization's value to the community are:

- Benefits to be provided to the community;
- Community needs;
- Duplication of existing services;
- Geographic service area;
- Methods of documenting the benefits to be provided to the community;
- Clarity of the project's stated goals and objectives;
- Longevity and reputation of the organization's service in the community;
- Documentation providing information on past benefits provided to the community;
- Follow-up documentation provided for previous appropriations; and
- Ability to obtain funding from other sources.

All applications will be reviewed by staff for approval as to form and forward to the Town Council for funding consideration. Applicants will be notified when a review date has been set.

# Comment from the Mayor... Youngtown, Bucolic But Well-Run

The mission of government should be the enhancement of quality of life through the adoption of well thought out, cogent policies designed and implemented to facilitate a robust economy and provide what I call 'bread and butter' services like public safety, streets, parks and libraries.

Youngtown is debt free with a healthy rainy-day fund and has managed to create a structural surplus in its budget for the foreseeable future. Youngtown's infrastructure is modern and well maintained and it is one of the safest communities in the valley

— secured and protected by the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) and Sun City Fire and Medical Department (SCFMD). Most importantly, all this has been accomplished without increasing the tax burden on the Town's residents. In Youngtown, at every level of governance, Council and staff routinely inject a healthy dose of common sense into the process of adopting and discharging policy.

When I first took office as your Mayor several years ago, I quickly realized that my most important function, as mayor, was to build and maintain a solid working consensus on the Town Council. work hard to avoid getting 'lost in the weeds.' We have been blessed, these past several years, with a Council and staff working together to consistently function at a very high level. This has allowed us to be highly productive and innovative in the accomplishment of our mission to enhance quality of life. You don't have to look far, beyond the borders of Youngtown, to appreciate how rare this is.

Youngtown consistently 'punches above its weight class' through its leadership involvement in regional organizations like the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG), Greater Phoenix Economic Council (GPEC), WESTMARC, Leadership West and the Community Development Advisory Committee (CDAC).



# Two deadly fires underscore impact of air flow and necessity of home fire sprinklers

Two deadly fires that recently occurred in the Midwest prompted me to resend this NFPA article.

The first incident, as I understand it, involved a fire in a non-sprinklered, four-story, eight-unit, wood-frame condo built around 1980. The fire began on the fourth floor in an open wooden stairway in the center of the units. Upon smelling smoke, the occupant opened his front door to discover a fire involving the wooden deck of the stairway and some vinyl siding.

Leaving his door open, the occupant ran to his kitchen to get a pot of water. He threw the water on the fire but couldn't control it. Again leaving the door open, the occupant returned to his kitchen for more water.

In the meantime, the condo began filling with smoke. The occupant opened the balcony door opposite the front door in an attempt to clear the smoke. He stepped onto the balcony to get some fresh air and rub his burning eyes.

The fire in the condo developed rapidly, and the occupant turned his attention to the four children sleeping in two bedrooms. Unable to reenter the condo due to the intensifying heat and smoke, the occupant climbed down the balcony to escape.

The fire department arrived within minutes. The team made an aggressive fire attack and search-and-rescue operation. They found the four children and two adults trapped in a unit. The children were treated and transported to the hospital, but unfortunately all four died.



The second incident involved a fire in a non-sprinklered, two-story, wood-frame, 3,200-square-foot, single-family dwelling built in 1994. The fire began on the first floor. Upon discovering the fire, the occupant opened both the front and back doors in an attempt to get the dogs out of the house.

The fire developed quickly, but the occupant escaped.

However, a guest in the home that was reporting the fire to 911 died.

The fire department arrived in minutes to find the home 75 percent involved. They were unable to conduct an interior fire attack or primary search. The body of the guest trapped on the second floor was later recovered.

These two incidents and countless others like them got me to thinking about airflow, fire dynamics, human behavior, and fire sprinklers. Many have long understood the effects of airflow on fire development.

My grandfather knew fresh air made an interior fire grow when, as a fire chief in the 1950's, he used to order his firefighters not to open anything in a home. Those of us who responded to home fires in the 1980's understood why this was important every time a police

officer would arrive ahead of us and kick in the doors to search for occupants. There were no occupants most of the time, but there was a working fire to attack.

More recently, those researching fire have coined the term "flow path." I love this term, as it clearly depicts the concept that fire development along the pathway of airflow increases significantly, rapidly, and (often) fatally. This problem is intensified when the flow path is affected by strong air currents, prompting the term, "wind-driven fires." Flow paths can be created naturally when, for example, a window fails from the heat of the developing fire. Or they can be created manually, such as when a door or window is opened.

Researchers are stressing the importance of fire suppression personnel understanding the impact of flow paths and impact on firefighting tactics and firefighter safety. So much so, that the tactical acronyms rooted in 60 years of firefighter training are now being changed to emphasize the importance of identifying and controlling flow paths.

Failure to identify and control flow paths is now

being recognized as a main contributing factor in several line-of-duty firefighter deaths. That being stated, what is the most effective and safest manner to control fire development due to airflow?

One way is to control the airflow. Educating firefighters and civilians on flow paths is a good first step. They can consciously coordinate the opening and closing of doors, windows, and other ventilation features of a building during a fire. This method will have limitations, since civilians might not react accordingly during unexpected and stressful fires.

Another method is to control the fire before the airflow has a significant impact on its growth and spread. Fire sprinklers could achieve this task within minutes of ignition. Outcomes would not be significantly affected by the reaction of the occupants. This would also be more effective and efficient than awaiting even the fastest response of firefighters, even with our pre-connected hose lines.

We need to continue efforts to educate people on air flow and home fire sprinklers or we will continue to experience the same types of fire I've mentioned for decades to come.

street maintenance program/schedule was presented to Council. Southwest Gas conducted a gas line abandonment project in the alleys, we re-painted various street stop bars/crosswalks, and replaced various sun faded and a traffic study was conducted on 113th and Michigan Avenues.

**Right-of-Ways:**

The Verizon cell site on 111th Avenue was completed, weed spraying of all alleys and right-of-ways was conducted, investigated and discussed block wall, anti-graffiti coatings, and painted bus stop surround wall.

**Storm water:**

A Storm water article ran in the April Youngtown Village Reporter in English and Spanish, storm drain inlets/outlets were inspected and/or cleaned, the storm water plan was revised, storm water training was conducted for Town employees, and the ADEQ storm water program audit was successful.

**Fleet:**

Machinery repairs were

performed in house and the fleet preventive maintenance was performed regularly.

**Parks:**

Duck round-up at Maricopa Lake was conducted, the re-circulation pump was re-built, water treated, and a shade structure was torn down in the Maricopa Lake parking lot. The Caliche Park shade canvas was replaced. Various picnic tabletops and seats were replaced, park trees were trimmed by the Public Works staff, and in the Cactus garden a shade structure was torn down and the garden was trimmed. We renewed the landscape maintenance contract for FY 2016/17, at the same cost, the Citizens' Dog Park sign was installed, painted sign wall at Memorial Park, the Clubhouse south side irrigation drip system was replaced, and park lights repaired using the high lift machine.

**Buildings:**

The Council Chambers remodel was completed on time and within budget. Public Works

Tomar gate device was installed, which will allow emergency response vehicles access to the Public Works maintenance yard. Public Works fire alarm panel was replaced, repaired and enhanced many Town owned building systems (plumbing, electrical, etc.), and the janitor services contract was renewed, at the same cost.

**Events:**

Both the Annual G.A.I.N. and Winter Miracle events were successful, with heavy volume of work from Public Works. Assisted Aqua Fria Ranch HOA with their Movie in the Park event.

The Town staff's goal is to work together as essential members of a team of knowledgeable, friendly, professional and hardworking employees dedicated to keeping Youngtown a quality place to live. We look forward to another year of providing quality amenities and services, in a fiscally responsible manner.




