# Other Important Items on the Ballot in November

It is already September and most voters have their sights set on November. While there is a big match up at the top of the ticket for President and United States Senate, voters should remember to review their entire ballot and make their vote heard on all local issues.

For example, one important issue that will appear further down the ballot is the Sun City Fire Bond. For the first time in its history, the Sun City Fire District is going out for a bond to address our current public safety

and emergency needs including:

- New emergency medical equipment
  - Replacing or refurbishing emergency response vehicles
  - Replacing or refurbishing fire engines and a ladder truck
  - Replacing worn out and aging equipment
  - Constructing a new fire station to replace Station 133 originally built in 1966
  - Improvements to existing facilities
  - Paying all costs in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds
- Emergency response calls in the district have increased by 11 % from the year before

– a total of more than 14,000 emergency response calls. The proposed bond was referred to the voters by the elected Sun City Fire District Board to keep up with demand and keep response times low.

The proposal is a total of \$10 million in general obligation bonds to be sold and be paid back over 20 years. The average annual tax rate per \$100 of assessed value will be estimated at \$0.21. Arizona Department of Revenue estimates full cash value of a residence within the district at \$78,890, meaning the average tax impact for a homeowner in the district is estimated

at \$16.57 per year or approximately \$1.38 per month.

If the November 8, 2016 bond election is successful, the District expects to sell bonds by means of a phased bonding program. The interest rate borne by the bonds would be determined by market conditions that exist at the time of sale, but in no event would the maximum interest rate on the bonds exceed 7 % per annum.

Current projections assume a 5 % average annual interest rate. Repayment of both principal and interest on bonds would occur over a period of not to exceed twenty (20) years from their issuance. The estimated total

cost of the proposed bond authorization, including principal and interest, is \$16,302,167.



# Lights Out! (Or, at least more (Waste)water under the bridge?? to keep them burning)

Arizona Public Service has initiated a residential rate case, which will impact Youngtown and its neighbors as well.

There are two main portions of a rate case, the revenue requirement or “the size of the pie” and the rate design, which is how the pie will be cut up.

The size requested this time around is \$166 million annually, a 5.74 percent net increase of what APS is currently charging its customers annually. If approved by the ACC as proposed, the average monthly bill for residential customers would increase 7.96 percent, from \$139.32 to \$150.41. This will be resolved as the facts are debated throughout the case.

The most controversial issue however, is APS’s request to initiate “Mandatory Demand Charges.”

Demand charges bill customers based on the maximum amount of electricity they use in one short time period during each billing cycle.

Utilities have described demand charges as a way to make sure that customers pay their fair share for the burden they place on the electric grid. Critics argue that demand charges can unfairly saddle customers who use little energy with high bills, based on infrequent usage spikes. One high spike each month could essentially wipe out the other measures consumers have taken to reduce electricity use or generate their own electricity with solar.

APS currently offers a Demand Charge rate as an option. Most customers either have no idea it

existed or certainly don’t understand how to utilize the complicated methodology to save on their energy bill. APS should institute a two to three year education program for users prior to instituting any type “mandatory” demand charge program. Transition and education are key. It is too early in the process to impose “mandatory” demand charges on “all” ratepayers, particularly the traditional non-solar rooftop customers. One step at a time here.

EPCOR has submitted their initial case to the Arizona Corporation Commission for an increase in Wastewater Rates for their five districts throughout the state. This case is scheduled to take about ten or so months to complete before the Commissioners decide what our actual new rates will be.

EPCOR was asked by the Commission to present three different scenarios of how to divide the total cost of service revenue required to operate their business. In other words, they want to look at changing the way the costs are allocated and how we are billed.

Each district’s rates are currently based on their costs of operation. The new proposal from EPCOR asks to put all the costs into a melting pot and then divide them by the number of customers – A Social Engineering approach.

We can go on and on about how this is likely illegal and how all past commissions have thrown this cost shift method out the window and so on. But suffice it to say, EPCOR is proposing the residents of the Sun City District (Sun City & Youngtown), subsidize the other districts to the tune of just under five million dollars (\$5,000,000.00) per year.

EPCOR is requesting, of the Commission, a Sun City District rate of \$25.03, which is what EPCOR has determined, is the fair value rate for our “longstanding” district. EPCOR then proposes we consolidate all their districts into one and our consolidated

rate will only go up to over \$40.00/mo. It doesn’t take a rocket scientist to see this is totally bogus.

No matter how EPCOR attempts to spin this – DON’T BELIEVE IT!

Every citizen of Youngtown & Sun City must write to the Commissioners stating your objection to EPCOR’s suggested full consolidation folly. We have been told “Numbers Do Count.” Therefore, **IF WE DON’T DELIVER a ton of letters ...WE WILL PAY!!!**


## Friends of the Youngtown Library

## In the Works...

Public Works is defined as a broad category of infrastructure projects, financed and constructed by the government, for recreational, employment, and health and safety uses in the greater community. They include public buildings, transport infrastructure, public spaces, public services, and other, usually long-term, physical assets and facilities. Though often interchangeable with public infrastructure and public capital, Public Works does not necessarily carry an economic component, thereby being a broader term.

The Public Works Manager is responsible

for managing the many different projects and facilities funded by the town, and which in most cases are intended for use by the citizens of the town. These projects and facilities are broad in scope, which include parks, road construction, municipal facility maintenance, storm water pollution prevention, etc.

The specific duties of a Public Works Manager can vary from town to town, but they are generally quite broad in scope. Essentially, the manager is in charge of managing the many aspects of budgeting, planning, constructing, and maintaining all town-funded projects and facilities intended for public use.

A Public Works Manager in a small town, such as Youngtown, is extensively involved in every public project, which the town carries out. Conversely, a Public Works Director in a large city may oversee a team of managers who in turn attend to the details of individual projects.

The specific duties of a Public Works Technician are varied and wide in scope. The technicians will operate heavy equipment such as tractors, backhoe's and street sweeping machinery. They perform repairs that involve skills found in the construction field such as landscaping, asphalt repairs,

concrete repair, street sign installation, painting, drywall, plumbing, electrical, welding, mechanical and fabricating.

They are jacks of all trades and masters of some. Public Works Technicians in a small town, such as Youngtown, have a great deal of public contact, requiring friendliness and great customer service skills.

**Intersections:** All intersections in Town that have a stop sign require that the driver come to a FULL STOP at that intersection. Rolling through a stop sign is illegal. The Public Works Department has witnessed MCSO stopping vehicles that roll through stop signs.

Do the right thing and come to a full stop. Not only will you do your part to help your community be safer, you may avoid a traffic citation, or worse, an accident.

**G.A.I.N. Event:** We look forward to the annual G.A.I.N. event being held at Town Square on October 28th from 4 – 8 p.m. The Public Works Department will attend the event to assist with facilitation.




