

Comment from the Mayor...

Good Government: the Quintessential Oxymoron

Sometimes good government seems like the impossible dream; you know what it should be; you know what it could be, but it's so rare it seems like it only exists in our dreams.

For government to be good it has to have two essential components: High Performance and Frugality. This yardstick of good government applies, most of all, to public safety--the core function, or prime directive, of government: If the people aren't safe, nothing else matters.

We, in Youngtown, Sun City and Citrus Point are fortunate, blessed really, to have a shining example of good government--the Sun City Fire and Medical Department (SCFMD), one of the busiest and best fire districts in Arizona. Last year, SCFMD responded to over 14,000 emergency response calls--an increase of 11% from the year before. More

than 90% of SCFMD's calls are medical and whether they're responding to a fire or a medical emergency, response time is of the essence and SCFMD has one of the best average response times at just over four minutes.

For the past 50 years, SCFMD has been a model of frugality while maintaining a very high performance level. Now, for the first time in its history, the District is asking the citizens to approve a bond issue to help catch up on

deferred vehicle and equipment maintenance and to build a brand new, state-of-the-art, fire station to replace station 133 which was built in 1966 and has long ago out-lived its useful life. This new station will be built at the NW corner of 111 and Michigan Avenues in Youngtown.

All three fire stations, including the new station 133, will have an ambulance, available on premise, as well as the necessary fire-fighting equipment along with some of the best trained firefighters and

paramedics in the state. In an emergency, when every second counts, first responders need the best and most modern equipment and training in order to respond quickly and effectively.

As a member of the Sun City Fire District Bond Advisory Committee, I know the District worked hard to keep the price of the bond as low as possible while staying focused on the need to maintain excellent response times and keep us safe.

The bond will allow the district to keep up


with growth, purchase new emergency equipment and vehicles and construct the new fire station that is critically needed. In the current interest rate environment, the cost of the bond issue will be very low, costing \$21.00 per year on a home valued at \$100,000.

I ask that you give serious consideration to the SCFMD bond issue on the November 8, 2016 ballot.

Watch your step around town

Youngtown residents will have to keep an eye out for some scaly creatures slithering around. The recent cooler weather in Arizona is causing some scaly snakes to come out of hibernation to soak up some warm sun. Snakes do not work off of a calendar and that they are all about temperature. The minute Arizona hits 80 degrees, snakes are going to know it. When they come out they will be ready to go and will be hungry. The Arizona Fish and Game Department reports that Arizona has 52 species of snakes and 13 of them are rattlesnakes.



a rattlesnake in the desert but they might not know that snakes can also be found in resident's backyards. You should look out on the sides of their houses, in plants and anywhere snakes could hide. If you see a snake you should turn around and walk the opposite way.

Snakes get a little bit curious and that people need to keep an eye out for snakes. People know to listen for the rattle of

The key to staying safe around snakes is for people to watch their step and avoid reaching into areas where they cannot see what they

are touching. Most snake bites occur when people are doing yard work in the early morning or late in the evening when snakes are hiding in bushes or near sprinkler systems. If snakes are welcomed by water and large amounts of debris, which attract pack rats or field mice it will possibly increase the potential for a snake to live in a person's backyard. Now that the Arizona weather is causing snakes to come out, people should also take a few steps ahead of themselves and that even though it is great weather, sandals and flip-flops are shoes that are just asking for a bite on the leg.

If you are bitten by a snake, stay calm, elevate the bite, and call 9-1-1!

Sometimes we had our doubts that the weather would change on us as we were living and working in the hot and often humid temperatures in the Valley of the Sun. As in life, when we are in the middle of an uncomfortable situation, it can be hard to see that it is temporary and that we must get through it in order to reap a reward. Our reward is living with beautiful Sonoran desert weather, for the next six

months. The cooler air is so welcoming, we feel renewed and refreshed! Halloween will be here soon, with many children parading through the streets going door to door in search of their next cavity. Please be careful driving through Town, as many ghosts and goblins will be walking after dark.

Vandalism:

Vandalism is “action involving deliberate destruction of or damage to public or private property.” The term also includes criminal damage such as graffiti and defacement directed towards any property without permission of the owner. Graffiti is the most common type of property vandalism (35%) according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics. How can Youngtown citizens help to stop vandalism?

Get to know your neighbors. It is important that you know the people around you and in

your community. This makes it much easier to spot someone that doesn’t belong and may be there to simply cause problems.

Form a community association or neighborhood watch program. You can’t fight vandalism on your own, so it is important that you engage your neighbors and others in your community in your battle as well. This not only helps them take a more active interest, but it also provides them with the opportunity to get to know each other.

Hold parties and social activities in your neighborhood. Getting to know your neighbor goes beyond knowing their name and face. You should develop a friendship or trust of some type so they know to watch your back while you are watching theirs.

Meet new neighbors as they move in. A great way to spot new neighbors is by watching homes that are for sale. Once you see the sign disappear go over and

introduce yourself.

Talk to your neighbors if you see something suspicious. Even if it is nothing, talking to them allows them to see you are concerned and take an interest, which will encourage them to do the same.

If you live next to one of the Town’s parks, please be observant for potential vandalism. If you observe someone damaging something in the park, place a phone call to the MCSO office at 602-876-1011. The residents are the eyes and ears of the community. It’s your community, don’t let someone destroy it.



The West Valley Genealogical Society’s next monthly meeting will be held at 1:30 p.m. on October 10th at the First Presbyterian Church.

This month’s featured speaker is Steve L. Parker.



Steve L. Parker

He is a graduate of the University of Utah and worked in the electronics field with companies such as IBM. Steve has travelled to over 60 countries and lived in Germany for five years. Since 2007, he has served as an expert lecturer for Mesa Family Search Library presenting on topics such as DNA, German and immigration research.

Steve will present on “Using DNA in Family History Research” and will discuss the types of tests available, who should or should not take the test, and what you will realistically learn from the results of DNA testing. Please join us as we delve into one of today’s most popular genealogy research topics.

This class is designed for the beginning family history researcher; prior knowledge is not necessary. Also, those who would like a refresher on basic researching are welcome. You’ll learn how to locate your ancestors through the use of various types of resources such as: the census, pension lists, church records and more.

• Special Research Evening: October 20th, 5:00 - 9:00 p.m.:

This informal gathering is an opportunity to visit with others interested in family history research. If you’re new to genealogy, assistance is available to help you access Ancestry and other databases or you can peruse the extensive library collections. 
