Comment from the Mayor...

Less Is Better; Least Is Best

Thomas Jefferson was the chief architect and author of the Declaration of Independence which declared "...that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed..."

In two of the most elegant and profound documents ever written—The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States—we, as a people, were given a blueprint for governing ourselves. Central to the theme of that blueprint was the notion that government was deserving of a natural and healthy suspicion and that its role was to be limited in our lives and applied sparingly.

Now, government is almost always looked at as the only venue for problem solving and innovation. While proclaiming 'protection of the people', state legislatures, the United States Congress and hundreds of municipalities pass thousands of new laws every year---incrementally extinguishing our God-given freedoms, one law at a time, in an Orwellian attempt to control everything in our lives from the quantity and quality of the food we may eat and drink to the kinds of vehicles we may drive.

Government has twisted the right of

'pursuit of happiness' into the bizarre notion of guaranteed, predictable and equal outcomes. In other words, government now tries to guarantee not only the pursuit happiness but also its capture thus assuring an official imprimatur of mediocrity for all.

This notion of universal governmental control extends across party lines and transcends partisanship. It is embraced by many, if not most, elected officials. It says that there is no problem, which can't and shouldn't be solved with more and bigger government because the people can't be trusted to their own devices.

Really? Are you kidding me?

Perhaps these elected officials should pay attention to something else Thomas Jefferson said: "That Government is best which governs least."

Dr. Arthur N. Seidner - from Podiatrist-Physician & Surgeon of the Foot

Dr. Seidner is a 2nd generation Podiatrist graduating from the California College of Podiatric Medicine in 1975, and completing a surgical residency in Phoenix. He moved his practice from Sun City to Youngtown in 2015. Dr. Seidner now concentrates his practice on non-surgical foot care including the care of thick toenails, ingrown toenails, corns, calluses, and warts. He treats heel and forefoot pain caused by plantar fasciitis, heel spur and/or nerve inflammation, which should be treated conservatively before considering any surgery.

Structural alignment problems causing bunions, hammertoes and sometimes just general foot discomfort can often be helped with biomechanically engineered foot orthotics (shoe inserts). The posture and position of the foot

is the basis for the rest of your posture. Poor foot alignment can cause many problems in the foot and the upper parts of the body, including ankle, knee, hip and back pain. Ready-made inserts from drug or specialty shoe stores rarely help those with more than the simplest of problems. Examination and casting for prescription foot orthotics is available in the office.

Dr. Seidner is a distributor of Dr. Comfort and Anodyne shoes for anyone needing deep or wide shoes. Diabetics, in particular, need regular foot care and possibly the well-made roomy shoes mentioned.

Dr. Seidner is accepting new patients and works by appointment. He also visits assisted living facilities on the west side if there are a minimum of two patients to be seen--if you have a loved one in such a facility, please let the owner know about Dr. Seidner's services. Fees for nail and corn/callus care are below Medicare allowable amounts. Call 623-974-3536 for more information or to make an appointment!

A Warm Welcome for new Youngtown Town Councilmembers

The Town of Youngtown welcomed incumbent Councilmember Jacob “Jack” Duran and new Councilmembers Charles Vickers and Susan Hout at the January 19th meeting. Councilmembers Jacob “Jack” Duran, Charles Vickers and Susan Hout were sworn in by Town Clerk, Stacy Anderson.

At the August 30th Primary Election, Duran won the seat with 20.30% of the votes, Susan Hout received 20.24%, and Charles Vickers received 19.49% of the votes.

The atmosphere was festive as residents and supporters came to witness the swearing in.

When the meeting reconvened, a motion and vote was taken to appoint Charles Vickers as the Vice Mayor. Vickers, said the campaign was a “roller coaster and a nail biter”, but he is proud it was a clean campaign.

Hout, who is the newest member of the Council, said that she has been preparing by reading and asking questions. “This is new to me,” she said. “Now it’s game time.”

Martin Luther King Jr.:

“Like anybody, I would like to live - a long life; longevity has its place. But I’m not concerned about that now. I just want to do God’s will. And He’s allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I’ve looked over. And I’ve seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight, that we, as a people, will get to the Promised Land. So I’m happy, tonight.

I’m not worried about anything. I’m not fearing any man. Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord.”

“I’ve Been to the Mountaintop” is the popular name of the last speech delivered by Martin Luther King, Jr. King spoke on April 3, 1968, at the Mason Temple (Church of God in Christ Headquarters) in Memphis, Tennessee. On the next day, King was assassinated.

We have set aside January 16th as the day to recognize the contribution that this civil rights leader, Mr. King, made to society. King’s main legacy was to secure progress on civil rights in the U.S.

Just days after King’s assassination, Congress passed the Civil Rights Act of 1968.

President’s Day:

The third Monday in February is designated in the United States as Washington’s Birthday, more commonly known as Presidents’ Day.

George Washington, known as “The Father of Our Country”, was the first President of the United States of America. He played a major role in the drafting of the Declaration of Independence signed on July 4, 1776, declaring the Colonies to be free and independent states.

He fought valiantly in the American Revolution and led the colonists to freedom as the Commander in Chief of the Continental Army.

He was a wise and courageous man admired for his honesty and strength of character. He also spoke of his having

chopped down a cherry tree and admitting it to his Father, as he could not tell a lie.

Vandalism:

Vandalism is the “action involving deliberate destruction of or damage to public or private property.”

The term also includes criminal damage such as graffiti and defacement directed towards any property without permission of the owner. Graffiti is the most common type of property vandalism (35%) according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics. How can Youngtown citizens help to stop vandalism?

Get to know your neighbors. It is important that you know the people around you and in your community. This makes it much easier to spot someone that doesn’t belong and

may be there to simply cause problems.

If you live next to one of the Town’s parks, please be observant for potential vandalism. If you observe someone damaging something in the park, place a phone call to the MCSO office at 602-876-1011. The residents are the eyes and ears of the community. It’s your community, don’t let someone destroy it.

Ducks:

This month, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will conduct a duck round up at Maricopa Lake. The ducks will be fed corn feed laced with an ingredient that causes the ducks to fall asleep.

Once asleep, the ducks are gathered up, and then transported to a private rehabilitation center. Though many of us enjoy the ducks, the duck population

needs to be controlled to be maintained at a healthy level to help keep the park clean.

Not all the ducks may be rounded up and other ducks may return to the lake. We can all do our part to help control over population by not feeding the ducks. Together, we can all do our part to help manage the duck population so we can enjoy this great amenity.

Lastly this month, we will start preliminary FY 2017/18 budget planning. Our goal is to produce a fiscally responsible budget focusing on providing aesthetically beautiful amenities while encouraging community pride and promoting transparent, effective and efficient government services. 


