Comment from the Mayor... Correcting Access Issues

Working with the Sun City Fire District, Youngtown officials are developing plans to improve access for emergency vehicles throughout the community, but particularly the Agua Fria Ranch subdivision. The community, on the southwest corner of Youngtown, was poorly designed, according to Mayor Mike LeVault. He said more housing density was allowed and the developer made up the difference by creating streets too narrow to allow for parking on both sides.

This is especially a problem at the north entrance to the community at Noffs and Fooks streets.

“When fire trucks can’t get through there because of parked cars, they have to take another route, which increases response times,” Mr. LeVault said.

Ron Deadman, Sun City fire chief, said there are other areas within the district — which services Sun City, Youngtown and Citrus Point — where narrow streets present an access challenges, but none as problematic as Agua

Fria Ranch. “Throughout the Sun City Fire District (includes Youngtown) there are some narrow winding streets that were never designed to permit parking on both sides of the road,” he stated in an email. “For the most part, these are isolated issues, outside the Agua Fria Ranch area.”

He added district officials continue to work with Youngtown officials to identify problem areas.

“The biggest (problem area) is Agua Fria Ranch,” Mr. Deadman stated.

Dave Scott, Sun City fire district board president, was pleased efforts are being made to address access issues.

“This will really help us with response times into that community,” he said.

Youngtown officials addressed one challenge last year when they straightened what Mr. LeVault called a dog leg on Peoria Avenue near 115th Avenue. Prior to that project, Mr. LeVault said access was difficult at that spot, especially when there was other traffic.

“We had one instance where a car was going east on Peoria and a lad-

der truck was trying to turn west onto Peoria,” he said. “Because they couldn’t make the turn, they had to turn around and go all the way to Olive Avenue to access the community from the south entrance.”

Most responses to Youngtown, including Agua Fria Ranch, originate from SCFD’s Station 133, 13013 N. 111th Ave. Sun City fire officials just began a project to build a new station on the west side of 111th Avenue two blocks north of the existing station. Jim Fox, Sun City fire marshal, said the new building will be a four-bay structure compared to the single bay on the existing station.

Breaking ground and starting construction was expected to start this week after some utility issues were resolved, Mr. Fox said.

Youngtown officials plan to make more improvements involving Peoria Avenue that are hoped to further enhance access to the community.

Mr. LeVault said plans are to extend Peoria Avenue south to connect with Agua Fria Parkway. The extension would run straight to a point between the com-

munity’s north perimeter and a business located there, wrapping around the Agua Fria Ranch perimeter and connecting with the parkway on the west side.

Mr. LeVault said that project could take two years to come to fruition.

“We are looking for grant money now to fund this project,” he said. “The town can’t do it alone on our budget. We have been creative

in funding our projects.”

Youngtown officials have been creative in other ways. They decriminalized much of the town code to allow code enforcement officers to write citations, including for parking. That has improved compliance, the mayor said.

“We still have to do something about parking in our streets,” he said.



2017 Bulk Collection

Town of Youngtown



Parks & Sons offers a semi-annual curbside bulk trash pickup to the Town of Youngtown where residents have the opportunity to place their items curbside for collection and disposal. This service helps enhance the community and provides an easy and convenient way for residents to dispose of items generated from their homes which are too large to dispose of in a regular trash container. **Collection is only offered to Parks & Sons customers with active residential service and an account in good standing (multi-family complexes are excluded from this collection).**

SCHEDULE

Crews will start collecting on the Monday of the scheduled collection (March 13, 2017 and October 16, 2017) at 6:00 am. **To ensure collection, you must have your items out at the curb on or before Sunday evening.** If you do not place your bulk trash out on time for service, you will not receive service until the next scheduled collection and you will be required to remove items from the curb. **Please do not place your items out more than three days prior to the scheduled collection start date.**

PLACEMENT



Items should be placed at the front of your property near the sidewalk (or curb if no sidewalk exists). **DO NOT PLACE ITEMS IN THE ALLEY.** Stacked trash should not be placed on sidewalks, curbing, or roadway in any manner that will interfere with or be hazardous to pedestrians or

vehicles. **Bulk trash must be at least five (5) feet from any object that could be damaged during the collection. Do not place bulk items on or near sprinklers, cable boxes, ornamental borders, water meters, or grass/desert landscaping. Do not lean against fences or walls.** It is your responsibility to maintain landscaping if disturbed by equipment or crews.

PILES

All materials must be neatly stacked. Piles should not exceed 8 feet long by 6 feet wide by 4 feet tall (or approximately a ¾ ton pick-up truck full). Crews may only spend 20 minutes per residence for piles who are not compliant with this limit. Material left behind must be removed from the curb by the resident and crews will not return until the next regularly scheduled collection.

CONTAINMENT

Bag and tie all leaves, grass, and smaller yard clippings. It must be bagged or boxed and securely contained to be collected. Collection crews are responsible for the removal of large debris only. The equipment used often leaves behind small debris, which is your responsibility to clean up (please sweep or rake after collection, if necessary).

Items not out in time or listed as unacceptable will not be collected and you will be required to remove them within two days following the pick-up week as scheduled. More information can be found online at www.parksandsons.com/youngtown-bulk-collection. Please check the website frequently for up-to-date information on your service.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- **Appliances:** stoves, washers, dryers, water heaters, microwaves, televisions. Appliances that use refrigerants are considered hazardous and will NOT be accepted in the collection.
- **Furniture:** sofas, chairs, tables, bookcases, desks, patio furniture, exercise equipment, mattresses.
- **Yard Waste:** tree limbs, cacti, yard clippings, grass, leaves. *Must be contained in bags or boxes!*
- **Wood:** fences, tree trunks less than 8 inches in diameter.

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS

- **Hazardous Waste:** motor oil, paint, paint thinner, cleaners, gasoline, batteries, appliances containing refrigerants (such as freezers, refrigerators, air conditioners)
- **Household trash**
- **Medical or Animal Waste**
- **Inert materials:** rocks, bricks, pavers, dirt, block, concrete, tile, asphalt, roofing shingles.
- **Auto Parts:** tires, motors.
- **Construction/Demolition Debris:** roofing material, glass doors/windows, mirrors.

HORARIO
C Las cuadrillas comenzarán el lunes de la semana programada (13 de marzo, 2017 y 16 de octubre, 2017) a las 6:00 am. Para garantizar colección, debe tener sus artículos en ó antes del domingo en la noche. Si usted no coloca su basura a granel a tiempo, no recibirá servicios hasta la próxima colección programada y se le pedirá que remueva los artículos. **Por favor, no coloque sus artículos en la banqueta más de tres días antes de la fecha de inicio programada para la colección.**

COLOCACION
Los artículos deben ser colocados al frente de su propiedad cerca de la banqueta (o el bordillo si no existe una banqueta). **NO COLOQUE ARTICULOS EN EL CALLEJON.** La pila de basura no debe colocarse en las banquetas, o en medio de la calle o de ninguna manera que pueda interferir o ser peligroso a los peatones ó vehículos. **Las pilas de basura deben estar más de cinco (5) pies de cualquier objeto que pueda ser dañado durante la colección. No coloque los artículos a granel en ó cerca de las regaderas del sacate, cajas de cables/satelite, bordes ornamentales, medidores de agua, el sacate o el jardín. No recueste los artículos en las cercas ó muros.** Es su responsabilidad de reparar o arreglar su yarda si se le daña por el equipo ó cuadrilla.

PILAS
Todos los materiales deben ser apilados cuidadosamente. Pilas no deben exceder 8 pies de largo por 6 pies de ancho por 4 pies de altura (ó aproximadamente 3/4 de tonelada). La cuadrilla únicamente pueden pasar 20 minutos por residencia en pilas que no siguen las reglas de colección. El material dejado atrás debe ser retirado por el residente y los equipos no regresarán hasta la próxima colección programada por la Ciudad y Parks & Sons.

CONTENCION
Las hojas, pasto y recortes del jardín pequeños deben ser colocados en cajas o bolsas y adecuadamente amarradas o selladas. Cuadrillas de colección son responsables de coleccionar desechos grandes únicamente. El equipo utilizado a menudo deja atrás desechos pequeños, y será su responsabilidad limpiarlos (Por favor, barra o rastrille, si es necesario).

Los productos que no estén colocados a tiempo o encontrados como inaceptables, no se recogerán y usted será responsable de removerlos antes de dos días siguientes a el día programado de colección. The Town has the right to construct in these areas, as in building sidewalks. Regardless of the Town's right-of-way jurisdiction, it is the residents' responsibility to maintain these right-of-ways, keeping them weed free and debris free. Just as the resident must maintain their entire front yard to the street, they must also maintain their back yard from their fence to the alley. Some residents state that the debris behind their fence in the alley is not theirs, that someone else dropped it off and they expect the Town to dispose of the debris and to pay for the related expense. 


