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From the Mayor... Youngtown — A Sustainable Future

This is an edited reprint of an article from March 2015. It lays out a few of the more ambitious infrastructure upgrades and improvements we have made, throughout the Town, over the years. Next month I will, once again, use some of my previous articles to demonstrate some of the important projects we have undertaken and completed in order to make Youngtown sustainable and our residents safer...

∎he Youngtown Town Council, staff and the citizens of Youngtown have faced, and solved, problem after another. We pulled the Town back from the edge of a fiscal cliff: Youngtown was nearly broke with antiquated, sub-par infrastructure and poorly written, often conflicting policies and ordinances.

The entire Town (residential and commercial) was brought International Fire-Code standards by laying nearly 3.5 miles of water pipe and adding nearly 5 dozen fire hydrants. Residents and Firefighters are now safer due to quicker access to an adequate water source for firefighting.

- 8+ miles of alleys have been paved, increasing quality of life by controlling dust and bringing the Town into compliance with PM 10 rules and regulations.
- Peoria Avenue completely was reconstructed (from the

base up) from 111th Avenue to 115th Avenue.

- Streetlights have been installed, in all neighborhoods, making residents safer.
- The 'Peoria Avenue Straightening' which eliminated the narrow, T-intersection at 115th and Peoria Avenues is now finished. As a result, emergency response times into Agua Fria Ranch have been greatly improved. The project also included a multi-use, bike/ped path from Nofs Drive all the way out to 111th Avenue.
- 'As infrastructure blueprints have been updated and corrected giving the Town the first complete and accurate set of public works/

infrastructure records in its history.

- Α permanent Base Adjustment (PBA) was presented to and overwhelmingly passed by voters, eliminating the need for repetitive approval of Home Rule status.
- budget The been process has professionalized. Conservative and thorough fiscal policies have created a very robust 'rainy-day' fund which easily exceeds a full year's operational expenses.
- Governmental operational costs have been reduced by nearly a third while service levels have been increased in several important areas.
- The Community Facilities District Bonds,

which financed much of the Agua Fria Ranch (AFR) infrastructure, were recently refinanced will and generate significant tax savings for AFR residents for years to come.

Youngtown debt free. Innovative fiscal policies continue to generate high levels without service raising the tax burden on residents or businesses.

Innovation, creative problem solving and amplification of existing resources are the hallmarks of your Town Council. Implementation of these programs is one more step down the road toward a sustainable and affordable future for Youngtown and its residents.





Holiday Fire Safety

As we usher in the festive season, it's crucial to ensure that the warmth of our celebrations doesn't turn into a fire hazard. Here are some essential tips for a safe and joyous holiday season:

1. MINDFUL DECORATING

- a. Choose flameresistant or flameretardant decorations.
- b. Keep decorations away from heat sources, candles, and open flames.
- 2. CANDLE CAUTION

a. Place candles in stable holders and on heat-resistant surfaces.

b. Never leave candles unatended and extinguish them before leaving the room.

3. TREE SAFETY

- a. If you have a live tree, water it regularly to prevent it from drying out.
- b. Keep the tree away from heat sources, such as fireplaces and heaters.

4. LIGHTS RESPONSIBILITY

- a. Inspect lights for frayed wires and replace damaged strands.
- b. Turn off holiday lights before going to bed or leaving the house.

5. COOKING AWARENESS

a. Stay in the kitchen when cooking,

especially if using the stove or deep fryer.

b. Keep flammable items, like towels and oven mitts, away from heat sources.

6. FIRE ESCAPE PLAN

- a. Ensure everyone in your household knows the escape routes in case of a fire.
- b. Practice fire drills to familiarize everyone with evacuation procedures.

7. SMOKE ALARMS AND FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

- a. Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries as needed.
- b. Keep a working fire extinguisher in the kitchen and know how to use it.

8. PET SAFETY

- a. Keep pets away from candles, decorations, and other fire hazards.
 - b. Be mindful of their

presence when cooking to avoid accidents.

9. MONITOR HEATING DEVICES

- a. If using space heaters, keep them at least three feet away from flammable objects and do not use extension cords.
- b. Turn off heaters before leaving the room or going to bed.

10. STAY INFORMED

- a. Stay updated on weather conditions.
- b. Have an emergency kit prepared in case of power outages.

In The Works

ut with the old, in with the new! The new year brings hope for a new future! May the best year be ahead for you and yours.

Public Works projects seem to take forever to complete. We have all heard about the failing public works infrastructure in America. Roads, public buildings, and bridges are aged and in need of repair or rebuilding to provide convenient and safe access for transit and people. For many years, the country has practiced deferred maintenance of public works projects. The major reasons are: uncertainty about funding; faulty estimating; funding agency mandates; stakeholder disputes; local building codes; poor project management and oversight; and ever-increasing material and labor costs, which have been recently exacerbated due to pandemic caused supply chain issues. Deferred maintenance costs have pushed capital replacement costs ever higher. Mostly due to funding issues, the nation's infrastructure is not kept in a state of good repair. As deterioration of roads accelerates, capital replacement costs escalate. In Youngtown, we face these same challenges, as we are a microcosm of the country. Youngtown has the benefit of being a small municipality with a



council that has the foresight to not only plan for public works projects but also to plan for contingencies, the unexpected, such as the pandemic. When pandemic crossed the shores into America, Youngtown pulled backed the reins on spending, halting projects, working from a maintenance mode to continue daily operations with minimal disruption to the services that the Town provides. The virus that caused the pandemic is probably here to stay and we now have more effective prevention and treatment methods to deal with it. The Town can now operate from more of a normal function, planning and implementing public works projects. That doesn't mean that it's all rosy in the garden. As we face labor shortages and the skyrocketing cost of materials, further analysis of planned projects and potential delays is inevitable. Material shortages are due primarily from demand-pull and cost-push. Demand-pull conditions occur when

consumers pull prices up,



while cost-push occurs when supply costs force prices higher. To rein in inflation, the country's monetary policy, via the Federal Reserve, is to increase the cost of borrowing by raising the interest rate of the central banking

system. For years prior to the pandemic, the Federal Reserve kept the interest rate lower than the inflation rate. When the pandemic hit our shores, the economic fallout caused significant hardship. In the early days of the crisis, tens of millions of people lost their jobs. Quarantine, unemployment, and business closures dealt a blow to consumer services. This resulted in the economy's capacity to produce goods and services. Post pandemic, pent

up consumer demand increased. Consumer spending grew the economy at a rate that was unsustainable, necessitating the Federal Reserve interest rate increase. This results in increased borrowing costs, labor, and material costs. If all goes according to plan, the economy will stabilize back to a steady growth of inflation, increases in consumer confidence and an increasing gross domestic product. Youngtown has been and will continue to be adaptable to economic conditions, managing budgetary expenses according to revenue projections and other, sometimes unpredictable, conditions.

Public Works will be proforming the follow services throughout the year.

The services are: weed spraying in the right of ways, to include twice a year in the alleys; environmental management (storm water, hazardous waste services); conducting preventive maintenance of the parks and public buildings; lake maintenance; utility right of way inspections; and street resurfacing.

Capital improvement projects that are planned for the remaining fiscal year are: Community Garden restroom; Town Hall flooring; MCSO building remodel; additional park tables and benches; park major tree pruning; building hvac upgrades; Schleifer Park basketball court resurface.

In the spring, all the streets from Grand Ave. south to Alabama Ave. will be resurfaced. The exact dates will be posted in future articles. Notification will be made to each residence and business in the area.



MARICOPA TITLE ALERT

Maricopa Title Alert- What is it?

Maricopa Title Alert is a free service offered to keep residents informed and take a proactive step against title fraud and the recordation of unlawful documents.

Users who sign up for the service will receive an email notification when a document is recorded under a name they are monitoring. They will be provided a link to review the recorded document.

Maricopa Title Alert is free. The only obligation of subscribers is that they maintain a current email address.

Maricopa Title Alert can monitor personal names and business names. Several names can be registered under one email address. You do not need to own property to use this service.

How do I sign up?
